



Joseph is pictured left in an unknown doorway in Wilstead. There is an obvious plaque above the lintel but it has not been identified.

Joseph and Lucy had seven children in Wilstead. Two girls died in childhood, Alice May aged a few weeks and Emma aged 5.

Son Herbert, born in 1881, is pictured below left as a chorister at All Saints, Wilstead.

Son Frederick is pictured below right in his World War 1 uniform.



Two further sons were Joseph and Ernest Sidney Masters. Ernest is remembered for owning the curiosity / antiques shop featured on page 12 of booklet 10 in this series and clearly shown on page 33 of booklet 13.

Their surviving daughter was Emily May Masters who was known as May. May married Frederick Bennett who is mentioned throughout this series of booklets in connection with the Red Lion P.H. Frederick was the son of Frederick William Bennett and Mary Ann (née Smith). He had several siblings – Jonathan, William, Harry, Elizabeth, Lucy, Frank, George and Joseph.

May later became one of the founding members of Wilstead Women's Institute and her daughter Doris was one of the first 'younger' members.
